Harvesting of crops did result in evacuation of home ranges. Swi hart and Yahner (1982b) a so recorded abandonment of home ranges 1 as a result of crop harvest. Emigration from home ranges within croplands resulted in autumn and winter concentrations of eastern cottontails within nearby wooded habitats.
