During the course of a few days the larva becomes somewhat shrivelled, and after a week or so sheds its skin and appears as a pupa. This habit of leaving the water, just at the time when the shrinkage in the volume of the rivers occurs, is no doubt very beneficial to the insect as, unlike many other neuropterous pupae, it is able to imbibe air and thus escape destruction by drought. The pupa of C. diversus, in its natural curved position, measures about 1 inch in length. Its limbs closely resemble those of the perfect insect, except the wings which are, of course, rudimentary. The larval gills are replaced by a series of wart-like projections, situated on each side of the first eight segments of the abdomen. This pupa is not endowed...
